# Landscape/Environmental Committee Meeting Minutes from September 21, 2011

Attending: David Gill, Chair: Rosanne Beatty, Mike Georgopolis, Carole Myles, Walter Perkowski, Dennis Pavlock, Ken Heckert, Jim Stepien, Mike Bergman.

#### 1. Old Business

- a. Viburnum Hedge at Cottages. Mike Georgopolis was emphatic that we cut only the hedge by the four houses by the entrance that has grown to 13-15 feet. These can be cut back to 6 feet with the intent of it growing back up to 7-8 feet. "Maintain" the whole hedge at 7, no more than 8, feet.
- b. Tree Trimming. Valley Crest Arbor Division is reworking the proposal to reflect Board priorities. This should be signed next week as a work order to proceed. About \$ 25,000 worth.
- c. Park Trace Border Plantings put on hold. The Board does not want to expand our water currently used for just the plants around the sign. Valley Crest (VC) will not guarantee new

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

I drive at or very close to the well-posted speed limit. As a result, I often have vehicles following me at a distance of approximately 6 inches from my rear bumper. I've had cars pass me on Rivendell Blvd going twice my speed. Memorably, after exiting the neighborhood, one person pulled up next to me at the light on Old Venice Rd, rolled down the window, gave me the finger, and informed me that only an OLD fool like me would actually drive at the speed limit.

Drivers need to understand that aggressive tailgating will not cause me to speed up. They will only be stuck behind me for at most a mile. Then they will be back on Route 41 where they can play games with all the other NASCAR wannabees.

  plantings without irrigation. Several committee members suggested the Water District put a meter on the tap and we pay for our use.
- d. Main irrigation pump. First we need a detailed written assessment by Valley Crest Irrigation Division of our overall and seasonal water "needs," including both the Cottages and rest of RCA common property. This should include an inventory of our current irrigation equipment. Second, we need an engineering assessment, including flow charts, plumbing schematics, drawings and specs of existing equipment. This should show all systems, pumps, intakes, valves, pipe size and zones. Also include the electrical layout and schematics showing power requirements, amp draws, breakers, timers, switches etc. Kevin Bridges or another qualified professional could do this. The committee recommends that the Board pursue these reports ASAP before purchasing new equipment. Set a date for the reports to be completed.

### 2. Lakes Report

- a. Cattails in Lakes have been chemically treated. A question was raised as to what can be done "if" cattails start to grow in the lakes with Littoral Zones?
- b. Geese have not left yet. By October first?
- Aquatic Systems Contract will be signed by October 1st, with an increase of \$40/ month.
- d. Jim Stepien said that Placid Lake still has floating algae. Will check.

### 3. Wetland Report

- a. Exotics removal is priority. Nuisance work on vines is secondary, but on-going. More vine control needs to be addressed behind some homes.
- b. Aquagenix Contract runs through December 31st. Will meet in October.
- c. Rosanne said that they may have oversprayed the herbicide along Pine View Trail and killed more than just the vines. In addition, some of the dead material should be removed. We need to look into this and advise Aquagenix.
- 4. New Business & Landscaping Projects
  - a. Front Entry. Residents from the Cottages have volunteered to plant and "maintain" flow-

- ers by the front entry and at the entry to the Cottages. We will need to monitor on-going maintenance (pull out dead stuff, weeds and replant new). VC plans to give us a proposal and digital picture on flowering plants for the point of the front entry island.
- b. The Board has approved mowing of the berms on the backside of four lakes next to the preserves. Reynolds Mowing should begin within 2 weeks. They will mow again in spring 2012. The trees and bushes will not be trimmed at this time.
- c. Turf Grass Repairs:
  - i.Next to sidewalk along Scherer by lakes is postponed.
  - ii. Crescent Park along Shadow Bay Way will be viewed Friday, 9/23, and work orders signed ASAP.
- d. Vandal Problems with Irrigation Timers was noted. May need new boxes and new keys.
- e. VC Contract should include removal of vines in the parks. There was discussion to consolidate all the work orders, specs, and scope of work write-up into a new valid written document, ASAP. Will need it for bidding for next year's contract. A better set of plans is needed that is color-coded to indicate where landscape maintenance is included.
- 5. Other Landscaping/Environmental issues
  - a. Common area on Foothill Court needs to be included in mowing and maintenance.
  - b. Budget should include replacement and planting of new trees.
  - c. Plastic boxes. Jim Stepien and Walter Perkowski have volunteered to remove and dispose of the two plastic boxes, that once held the solar irrigation equipment and generator, located at the end of the land bridge between Placid and Eagle lake.
  - d. Generator. We have a John Deere portable, 6750-watt gas generator, now stowed in the pool closet. The LEC recommends it be maintained or sold through The Woodlands Word, auction, or raffle. Proceeds could purchase a tree for a park with a plaque.
- 6. Next meeting: (Second Tuesdays of month): <u>Tuesday, October 11th, 7:00 PM, at the Cottages</u> <u>Clubhouse.</u>

Further improvements are in the planning stages and are being discussed to update the bathrooms by adding new stalls to the men's and ladies rooms, add electric hand dryers to both bathrooms, install new sinks, faucets, toilets and urinals. As long as Alexandra De Stefanis can remember, the arts have been a major theme of her life and work. Growing up in Milan, Italy, she was encouraged by her family to appreciate music and the arts in all forms. "I have a cousin who did restorations at the Vatican and taught art at the Accademia Delle Belle Arti in Rome. He is a figurative artist. Another cousin, an abstract painter, taught art and was director at the Accademia Di Belle Arti in Reggio Calabria. My aunt was an opera singer and my brother was a sculptor," Alexandra recalls. She moved to New York in the early 60's and while raising a family, worked as an interpreter and translator for several Italian fashion houses during their annual shows.

A Rivendell resident, Alexandra is a city director for Sarasota Sister Cities Association (SSCA). This organization is involved in person-to-person exchanges with eight "Sister Cities" across the globe with emphasis on citizen diplomacy, arts, education, business, sports, civic activities and government. Treviso, Italy is one of the eight cities twinned with Sarasota.

Presently, she is planning a photographic exhibit—The Veneto through the eyes of Palladio and Canova by Cristina Madeyski. The photos offer a surreal interpretation of the classic works of these Venetian artists. The images are transfigured allowing them to speak to the viewer through forms and color freed from their commonplace connections and contexts. Cristina is an international photographer who won first place in the SSCA International Photographic contest two years ago. This exhibit will open on February 6, 2012.

Last spring Alexandra brought, for the first time in the U.S., an International Exhibit of Illustrations for children's books—78 pieces composed by artists from all over the world that for the past 30 years have exhibited in Sarmede (near Venice, Italy).

"I am very excited that my daughter, Simona, is relocating to Sarasota from Texas. She is opening a home décor boutique called M'Bellish Home and Body on Pineapple Avenue in downtown Sarasota that will carry a selection of international merchandise for the home and women's jewelry and accessories. The opening is planned for October 2011."

When she isn't traveling to different locations in the states to visit her five children and six-month old grandson, she teaches Italian, weaving Italian culture, history and artistic heritage into each lesson. Alexandra travels to Italy yearly visiting family and embracing her Italian heritage. She often travels with Susanna Wriston, owner and operator of Italia Dolce Vita, and Vice City Director for Treviso and SSCA. Italia Dolce Vita offers tourists rare insight to places seldom seen by the average visitor.

### Watch Out For Chinch Bugs

If your grass has dead spots in some places, it is most probable that it has chinch bugs. A chinch bug will suck the sap out of the stems and roots of the grass. Even if you plant new grass it will die again if these bare spots have not been treated. Chemical chinch bug treatment will stop these bugs from spreading. Chinch bugs lay their eggs and hatch in as little as one week during summer. When these chinch bugs are fully matured, they become black with white wings on their backs. If chinch bugs are not treated with a pesticide, they will do more damage and will fly to other locations in the lawn.

Inspect your lawn at least once a week during summer months, or ask a lawn care professional to check out your lawn. Early detection and chinch bug insect control can stop a major infestation from occurring. Infected lawns often need multiple treatments in order to eradicate all the chinch bugs. They also tend to lay their eggs in dry areas. If you don't find any chinch bugs, it could be a sign of a lack of water.

- Never allow the flag to touch anything beneath it, including the ground, floor, water or other items.
- When a flag is so worn it is no longer fit to serve as a symbol of our country, it should be destroyed by burning in a dignified manner.

On Dec. 12th, 2007, I earned my American citizenship after a long, 6-year process. I am proud to be an American; we fly our flag proudly as I am sure all of you do. Let's do our best to make sure that our display is worthy of the representation.



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

# Through The Lens: Part 3: Black-bellied Whistling Duck (BBWD) By Kay Mruz

While doing research for this article I was surprised to learn that Black-bellied Whistling Ducks (BBWDs) are very "un-duck-like" and actually have a number of goose characteristics.

The first noticeable similarity to a goose is the Bawd's long neck and legs. Secondly, as the most erect of all ducks, they lack the cute "waddle" movement when walking. Body color is a rich cinnamon, and as the name says, they have a black belly. The upper part of their neck and face is grey with a dark hind neck stripe and white-eye ring. The bill is bright orange. Legs are a pink-red color. Both sexes are similar in appearance. When in flight, a white wing bar, unique to whistling ducks, is visible. Juveniles' bills, legs and feet are grey, and their over-all color is significantly paler. Adult plumage is reached at 8 months.

If you are a year-round residents of Florida, you can hear the high-pitched, rapid whistle call of the BBWD near the shallow areas of ponds, lakes and marshes. BBWDs also prefer to have lots of trees close by. Once called the Black-bellied Tree Duck, it joins the Wood Duck as one of eight duck species that roost and nest in trees. BBWDs often feed at night, eating a wide variety of plant material and occasionally arthropods and aquatic vertebrates. Like geese, these ducks can be found foraging in recently harvested fields for any grain left behind.

BBWDs often partner for life. Both parents share in the incubation and rearing of the ducklings. This is another trait they share with geese. Breeding starts at one year of age. BBWDs prefer to build their nests in hollow trees or nest boxes, but will nest on the ground if necessary. One egg a day is laid; the average is 13. Incubation lasts 26-31 days. Chicks will drop from the nest at 2 days of age and are

able to care for themselves! They will stay with the parents for up to six months. There is one brood, possibly two if the nest is abandoned, per season. Adults molt after the breeding season ends and are unable to fly until their flight feathers regrow. During this time, usually 30 to 40 days, the normally sociable duck becomes shy and remains hidden in tall vegetation.

No matter how "un-duck-like" Black-bellied Whistling Ducks want to be, they still share one thing with all the other ducks that reside in Rivendell's ponds...they make you smile.

The Battle of Franklin in Tennessee occurred on November 30, 1864 and resulted in more than 9,000 casualties. Carrie's house had been commandeered to serve as a hospital, and she helped care for the wounded and the dying who were then buried in a neighboring field. When the owner of the field threatened to plough it over, Carrie and her husband transferred over a thousand bodies to their own cemetery and this became the only private cemetery for Confederate soldiers. Due to her almost obsessive concern for the dead, Carrie became known far and wide as the Widow of the South. ### Recipe served at Book Group in September Easy Graham Cracker Heath Bars from Pam Babbitt

### Ingredients:

Graham crackers
1-cup butter
1-cup brown sugar
2 cups crushed pecans
12 oz semi-sweet chocolate chips



### **Directions:**

Break graham crackers in half and then guarters.

Line cookie sheet with graham crackers. Use a "12x15" cookie/baking sheet.

Sprinkle 2 cups crushed pecans over graham crackers.

Bring 1-cup butter and 1-cup brown sugar to a boil.

Pour the sugar-butter mixture over the grahams and pecans.

Bake at 350 degrees for 10-13 minutes.

Remove from oven.

Sprinkle with 12 ounces of chocolate chips.

Let chips melt, then use knife or back of spoon and gently smooth the melted chips over the top (careful not to pull the pecans up).

Cool in refrigerator.

These also freeze very well.

## Medical News You Can Use: Insomnia: Improving your sleep

Insomnia, a common problem, means that you have trouble falling asleep or staying asleep. Most people have sleep problems now and then because of temporary stress, worry, or an irregular schedule. But when you have trouble sleeping for weeks or months, it can lead to health problems.

The good news is that if you can change the way you think about sleep, and make simple lifestyle changes, you may improve how well you sleep. Keeping a sleep diary can help you figure out what helps and also what may get in the way of a good night's sleep.

Changing one or more habits may improve how well you sleep. Research shows that lifestyle habits and sleep practices are strongly related to overall sleep quality. Go to bed at a regular bed-time every night. Wake up at the same time each day, including weekends, even if you haven't slept well. Your exercise habits and the physical environment of your bedroom can also affect how well you sleep. Regular exercise can help you sleep better.

What, when, and how much you eat and drink can affect your sleep. Eating a large meal close to bedtime can make it hard to sleep, but a snack right before bed may help you sleep. Alcohol may make you feel sleepy, but it may upset your sleep. If you usually have 1 or 2 glasses of wine before bed and seem to wake up at 3 a.m., have a drink with no alcohol (and no caffeine) instead. Don't go to bed thirsty. But don't drink so much that you need to urinate often during the night.

Set aside time for problem solving earlier in the day so that you don't carry anxious thoughts to bed. Keep a notepad by your bed to write down thoughts or worries that keep you up at night. Do something relaxing before bed Try deep breathing, yoga, meditation, tai chi, or muscle relaxation.

Take a bath. Play a quiet game, or read a book. Reserve the bed for sleep and sex. A bit of light reading may help you fall asleep. But if it doesn't, do your reading elsewhere in the house. Don't watch TV in bed.

Be sure your bed is big enough to stretch out comfortably, especially if you have a sleep partner. Use earplugs, or sleep in a different room if your partner's snoring keeps you awake. Reduce noise in the house, or mask it with a steady low noise, such as a fan on slow speed or a radio tuned to static. Use comfortable earplugs if you need them. Keep the room cool and dark. If you can't darken the room, use a sleep mask. If watching the clock makes you anxious, turn the clock so you can't see it.

Consider making your bed off-limits to your children and your pets. Their sleep patterns may be different from your own and may affect your sleep. Don't take naps during the day. Don't use tobacco, especially near bedtime. Nicotine is a stimulant, which can keep you awake. Don't lie in bed awake for too long. If you can't fall asleep, or if you wake up in the middle of the night and can't get back to sleep within 15 minutes, get out of bed and go to another room until you feel sleepy.

Pick one thing to change, and see how that change affects your sleep. After a week or two, add another change. Your sleep should improve. If it doesn't, talk to your doctor.

# Sarasota Environmental Services Residential Yard Waste

### What to do for your yard waste, garbage and recycling pickup?

Place **yard waste** separately at the curb in a garbage can (do not mix yard waste with garbage) or kraft bag that does not exceed 40 pounds and does not protrude more than one foot above the edge of the container. The use of plastic bags for yard waste is discouraged, but allowed.

Branches, limbs and bulky yard waste should be bundled and tied together with string. Bundles must not exceed 40 pounds or four feet in length.

Bundles should be stacked as neatly as possible at the curb.

Containers and bundles must be set out at curb by 6 a.m. on pickup day (Thursday for Rivendell). Cans must not exceed 40 pounds; must be leak proof and waterproof; trash should not protrude more than one foot above the edge.

Bags must be closed and unbroken. Loose trash will not be picked up.

Cans, bags, and tied bundles must not exceed four feet in length and weigh 40 pounds or less. Items weighing more than 40 pounds require a special pickup. Call 941-493-4100 for information.
