Sarasota County's Ordinance & Guidelines for Fertilizer and Irrigation Management

Rivendell ponds are interconnected and at risk for algae blooms which are exacerbated by excess fertilizer runoff from our own lawns and community common areas. Sarasota County has an Ordinance (No. 2007-062) to reduce fertilizer runoff into our waters. The County also issued guidelines to manage irrigation responsibly that saves water and reduces nutrient runoff from over-watered lawns. Please follow these recommendations to help minimize the presence of unsightly algae in our ponds, improve the health of our waters, and keep property values strong. Here's What You Need to Know about FERTILIZING

- **June 1 to Sep. 30:** do not apply fertilizer containing nitrogen or phosphorous to turf or landscape plants.
- No fertilizer should ever be applied within 10 feet of any pond, wetland preserve or impervious surface.
- No grass clippings and vegetative debris may be washed, blown, swept or deposited into water bodies, preserves or roadways.
- Sarasota County also recommends installing Low Maintenance Zones (LMZs) around ponds and wetlands to help absorb excess nutrients from runoff.



Here's What You Need to Know about IRRIGATING

- Irrigation is allowed only on Tuesdays for even-numbered addresses and Thursdays for odd. Irrigate only on your assigned day before 10:00 AM or after 4:00 PM.
- Inspect sprinkler heads & rain sensors regularly. Maintain them in good operating condition to ensure water is not sprayed onto streets and non-landscaped areas.
